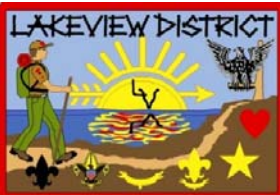

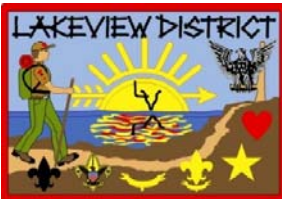
Units wishing to add new Merit Badge Counselors, the following steps are required.

1. Counselor must be eighteen years or older and have knowledge of subject they wish to instruct.
2. Applicants must fill out BSA Adult application, including the Authorization and Disclosure Statement preceding the application. Both of these forms must be signed by the applicant. Social Security Number and Drivers License Number must be included on the application or it will be rejected. Scout and Committee leaders are not required to sign the application form.
3. Applicant must fill out Merit Badge Counselor form, found on the Lakeview District Web Site.
4. Both forms must be turned into a District Advancement Representative at Roundtable.
5. Applicant must take Youth Protection Training, found on the Council Website, and adhere to all youth protection guidelines. If a counselor is not Youth Protection trained, he/she must have a youth protection trained adult present when teaching scouts.

Applicants are considered qualified Merit Badge Counselors after they have been added to the District Merit Badge Counselor List. There is no charge to become certified as a Merit Badge Counselor.

The next chapter meeting will be on Thursday, September 3, at 7:30 PM.

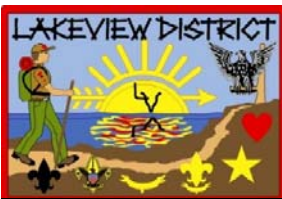

Cub Scout Family Camping Policy

[Cub Scout Family Camping Policy](#) (PDF) Revised 2008, effective until August 30 2008

In order to meet BSA standards and to be covered by BSA liability insurance, Cub Scout Pack Family camp-outs must include a Baloo and a YPT certified leaders and must be held at a facility that has been inspected and approved by the Council Camping Committee. Unit leaders may assume personal liability for campouts that are not conducted at an approved facility or that do not follow BSA policies. Camp Rangers will not allow Packs to set up camp without a Baloo or YPT certified leader onsite. The Longhorn Council Camping Committee has approved 22 locations for Cub Scout Pack Family Camping. The following is the Longhorn Council's Family Camping Policy.

1. Family camp-outs may be conducted TWICE per year, in addition to participation in Council activities.
2. Pack Family Camping at Council activities does NOT count toward the limit of two outings per year. These include Fall Festival, Cub-O, Cub Family Adventures, Webelos Woods, and Cub Resident Camp.
3. Family camp-outs may include one family or a group of families from the same unit.
4. Family camp-outs are to involve fun-filled, no-pressure, non-competitive activities which include participation by family members and siblings. Cub Scout activities should not include advancement for advancement's sake.
5. At least one adult from the Pack who is attending a campout must have completed BALOO (Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation) and Youth Protection Training. The person(s) holding BALOO and YPT certification must be present at the family campout the entire time.
6. Family Camping reflects the Longhorn Council's commitment to offer a progressive Scouting program with age-appropriate camping activities.

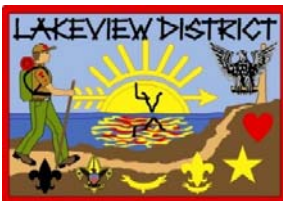

The goal of the pack camping activity is to provide a successful Pack camping outing that is:

1. Fun
 2. Based on the purposes of Cub Scouting.
 3. Successful in whetting the appetite of the Cub Scouts, his parents, and the leaders to want more of the outdoors.
- II. Family camp-outs may include one family or a group of families from the same unit.
- III. Family camp-outs may be conducted twice per year, in addition to participation in Council activities such as Webe-los Woods, Resident Camp, Beach Festival and Family Adventure Camps.
- IV. Family camp-outs are to involve fun-filled, no-pressure, non-competitive activities which include participation by family members and siblings. Cub Scout activities should not include advancement for advancement's sake.
- V. At least one adult from the Pack must have completed BALOO (Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation) and Youth Protection Training. The person holding BALOO and YPT certification must be present at the family campout the entire time.
7. Family camp-outs conducted as part of a Scouting program must be held at a facility that has been inspected and approved by the council camping committee to meet BSA Standards. Unit leaders may assume personal liability for camp-outs not conducted at an approved facility. Camps currently approved for Family Camping are:

BSA National Fee Increase and Recharter

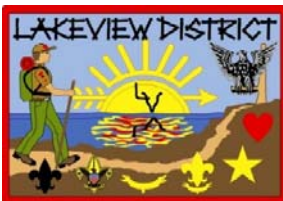
Effective January 1, 2010, BSA's national fee will increase from \$10 to \$15 per scout and adult leader. This fee increase will affect everyone at recharter time, since all unit charters will be renewed effective January 1st.

All units should designate a person to handle the unit recharter by October 10th. Recharter Training for traditional units will be held 7:00 p.m. Thursday, October 15, at Crown of Life Lutheran Church in Colleyville. Recharter Training for LDS units will be held Saturday, October 31st at the Colleyville Stake. Each unit should send a representative to attend the training and pick up the unit's recharter package.

In addition, each unit needs to designate a ScoutParent Unit Coordinator for the unit as part of the recharter program this year. In order to recharter, every unit must have the following positions filled at a minimum:

- Charter Organization Representative (appointed by the Charter Organization.);
- Committee Chair (appointed by the Charter Organization);
- Unit Leader (Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, Crew Advisor, Team Leader, Ship Skipper);
- ScoutParent Unit Coordinator (who serves as one of the unit's Committee Members); and
- Committee Member.

Setting a Reasonable Training Goal

As we start the new school year, many current leaders are changing positions and others are joining Scouting as leaders for the first time. Many of them will seek out the training programs that are available to help them in their new roles, but unfortunately *some will not*. We ALL have a shared responsibility to encourage these leaders to get trained and even go out of our way to ensure that they get trained.

So what do you think would be a reasonable goal? Many units set a goal of about 80%. Some are more ambitious and say 90%. But what about 100%? Is it reasonable to shoot for 100%? Is it practical to expect that every leader will complete the requirements to wear the "Trained" patch? I say ABSOLUTELY!

We expect every leader to be registered. We expect every leader to wear a uniform. We expect every leader to attend unit meetings regularly. Why, then, would we not expect every leader to be fully trained? It may not be easy but it won't happen unless you EXPECT it to happen!

When you think about it, it's really becoming easier to get leaders trained:

With the introduction of the new "This is Scouting" course, 3 of the 4 requirements to be "Trained" are now available online.

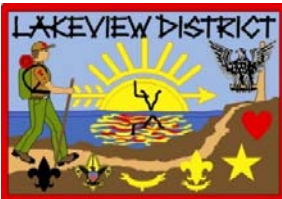
Courses across the Longhorn Council are now compiled into a single spreadsheet which is posted on the Lakeview website under the Adult Training section. (103 course offerings listed!!)

One-on-one or small group training can also be conducted in situations.

We all know the saying "Every boy deserves a trained leader." Perhaps we should change that to "Every boy deserves nothing but trained leaders!" 100% Trained is not only possible, it's the only reasonable training goal when you consider how important our customers – the youth – really are!

Fall Festival and Haunted Hayride Planning Guide

The most important part of any camping outing is the planning. Please take a few minutes to read the following paragraphs.

Directions to camps and campsite maps are available at www.longhorncouncil.org

Check-In: Located at the HQ building and begins at 10 a.m. Please send **one** adult with a complete roster of all the youth and adults that are with you (the roster is used in case of an emergency). We will be able to accept final fees for each unit at that time. This adult will also pick up the Pack's event wristbands (required for activities, safety, hayride, and meals), patches, and t-shirts.

Speed Limits: Please obey the speed limit signs throughout camp. Speed Limit on the main SR2 road is 25 mph. Please go slow in the dust following a caravan. Speed limit in the main SR2 camp and program areas and at Camp Tahuaya is 10 mph. Watch for livestock, scouts, and other cars. *NO ONE is allowed to ride in the back of Pick-up trucks.* Everyone in every vehicle must have a seatbelt on.

Campsites: Please stick to your Pack's assigned campsite so that late arriving members of your Pack can find you. Put as much equipment as you can into one or more vehicles. After you unload and set up camp, please **move all vehicles to one of the parking areas**. Part of the fun is camping in the woods, not in a parking lot. **Absolutely NO parking on roads or in the campsites.** Please bring a few trash bags with you; you must pack out all of your trash with you on Sunday. Our latrines and showers are not furnished with toilet paper, paper towels, or soap so please bring your own.

Parking: Parking at SR2 is available at the Day Parking lot by the main flagpole and in the lot past the Health Lodge. Anyone with limited mobility may be dropped off at the Dining Hall. **ONLY** Handicapped vehicles are allowed to park near the Dining Hall and move through the area during the day.

1. Parking if you ARE camping: Unload vehicles at your campsite and return them to the parking area.
2. Parking if you are NOT camping: Unload vehicles at parking area. **NO** parking on roads without permission from the Ranger.

Rules to help you plan:

1. If a scout and an adult are sharing one tent, then the adult must be a parent or guardian of the boy. Adults sharing tents with youth is discouraged.
2. **NO ONE IS TO RIDE IN THE BACK OF A PICKUP.** You must have seatbelts for each person in the vehicle.
3. The **MAXIMUM** speed in camp is 25 miles per hour, 10 MPH in the camp and program areas. If there are youth on the road then one must drive **NO** faster than walking pace (about 3 MPH).
4. Instructors on the BB and Archery range have a heavy responsibility for your child's safety. They can and will ask anyone that is not serious to leave the area. Please help them to keep the ranges safe.
5. Please report all major accidents to the Camp office.
6. Bring a poncho, raincoat, or other rain gear with you. The show will go on rain or shine.
7. Remember that we are here for the boys and that we must let them have fun.

Activities: The activities begin at 1:00 PM and continue till 4:30 PM. Choose activities that interest you and are not crowded and rotate through them all. Your pack is free to go to whichever activity they choose-there is no set rotation.

Lunch: Lunch is on your own.

Be sure to follow instructions of the tractor driver.

Sunday Breakfast: A continental breakfast snack is served from 8:00-9:00 a.m. Breakfast is open seating.

Chapel: Remember that a Scout is reverent and respects the rights of others to their religious beliefs. Chapel is a nondenominational service at 9:00 a.m.

Clean em' up and move em' out: Chapel is over around 9:45 a.m. Time to head home! Everyone should police each campsite before leaving. Remember that a scout is clean and always leaves a campsite cleaner than when they found it. Camp closes at 11:30 a.m., if you plan to stay longer, you must clear this with the staff and Ranger. Staff will be packing equipment and not able to provide any supervision.
